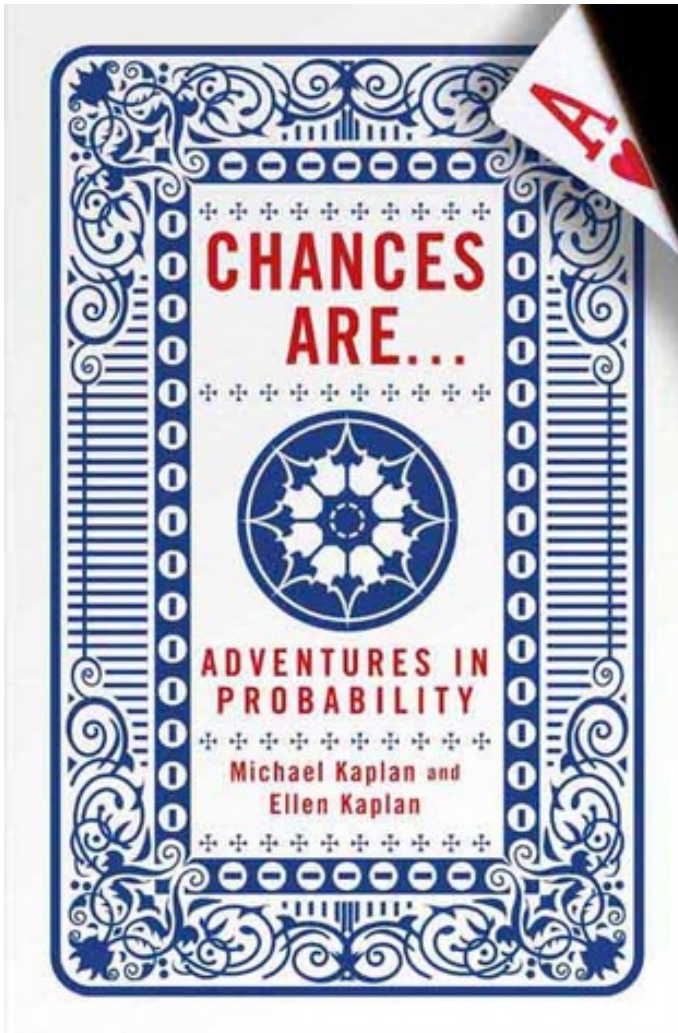

We search for certainty, but find only likelihood. All things are possible, only one thing actually happens; everything else is in the realm of probability. The twin disciplines of probability and statistics underpin every modern science and sketch the shape of all purposeful group activity-politics, economics, medicine, law, sports-giving humans a handle on the essential uncertainty of their existence. Yet while we are all aware of the hard facts, most of us still refuse to take account of probability-preferring to drive, not fly; buying into market blips; smoking cigarettes; denying we will ever age.

There are some people, though-gamblers, risk buyers, forensic experts, doctors, strategists-who find probability's mass of incomplete uncertainties delightful and revelatory. *Chances Are* is their story. Combining philosophical and historical background with portraits of the men and women who command the forces of probability, this engaging, wide-ranging, and clearly written volume will be welcomed not only by the proven audiences for popular books like *E=MC2* and *The Golden Ratio* but by anyone interested in the workings of fate.

Insightful reviews

Andrew Skretvedt: Few of us have a good grasp of probability, as the good ol' Monty Hall problem illustrates (which is interesting, because that problem isn't covered in this book). This is a very approachable book requiring little math skill, although there are a few sections with symbology that might look scary to the uninitiated. Looks are deceiving. It's pussycat stuff. The reader is rewarded with a better awareness of the subject, which should be helpful when analyzing choices or evaluating the statements of others.

The book tries to combine a colorful explanation of statistics, with some interesting history and outcomes, but neither were done terribly well. Also the book often lacks continuity, maybe because it was written by two authors.

The bell curve indicates the hint of an almighty hand -- though, of course, specific situations can lie prosperous the midpoint. DeMoivre himself used to be simply such an outlier. He received little from his genius; even his curves at the moment are named for Gauss and Poisson. He used to be constantly a section an excessive amount of or too little for the realm he lived in, yet his personal sequence eventually converged on the age of eighty-seven. Second, if this didn't come upon from the examples I provided, I may still make clear that the Kaplans do not current a fatalist, pessimistic international view. Rather, via repeated exploration of the results of a global with limitless edition and tentative (in phrases of reliability) underlying logic, they suggest humility, curiosity, and wonder. it sort of feels to me profoundly good and exquisitely ironic that their completely rational, agnostic research should still percentage a big end of theism. yet i feel they'd argue that that is easily what comes of being human.
