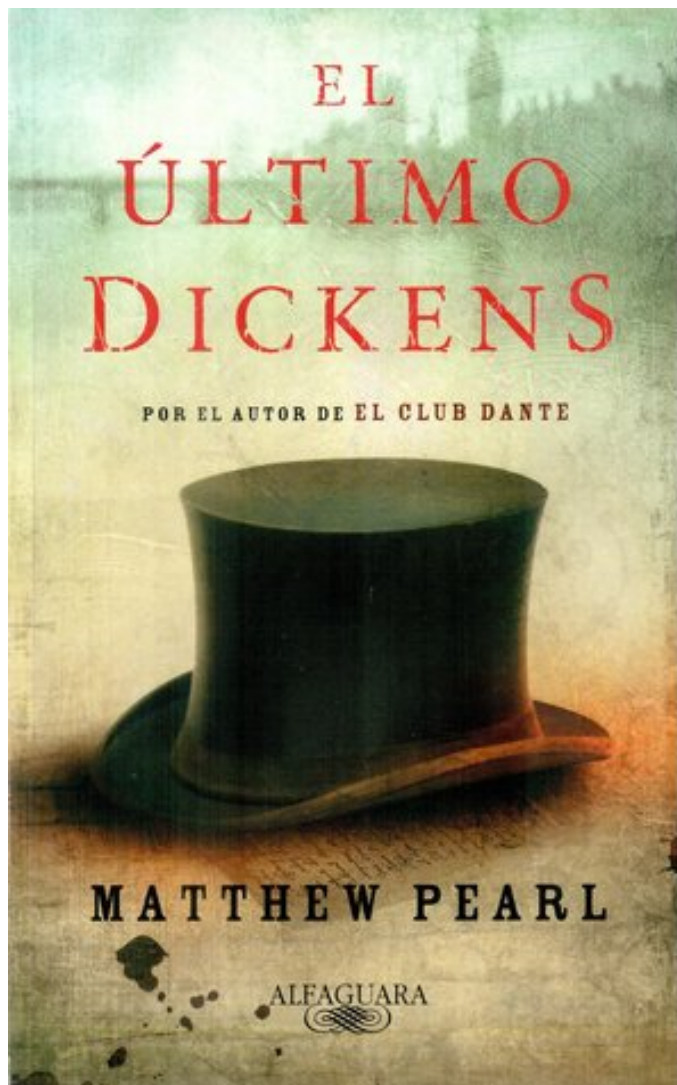

Henrik: In several ways this was an odd read. Some thing I liked very much and some things I did not like that much.

A few years ago a reviewer called Pearl "the literary Dan Brown," and I can see why. Of course it's not really that simple, but the point is clear enough. Brown has cliffhangers after each chapter, all of it evolving around a mysterious plot where the protagonist races against time to solve the case at hand by figuring out fitting the jigsaws to the overall puzzle--with people trying to kill him, a woman tagging along the ride etc., etc. The same goes for Pearl, at least in this novel, which is the only one I have read by him so far.

There's nothing wrong with building a story on those well-proven formulas, in my opinion. It's more a matter of how you do it, and, as a result, how *it works*.

Pearl has clearly done a *lot* of research for this book. The time, the kind of people and positions, the book industry in particular (I didn't know the copyright laws were so, well, "wild west-like" in the US, did you?), and Dickens' last US adventure. All of it very fascinating and something that helps tremendously building a believable and constantly fascinating world in which the characters walk around.

Unfortunately the characters never come across as *living people* but stay stock characters of sorts; stay flat, one-dimensional. Also unfortunately, the research shows its head frequently, often getting in the way of the *storytelling*, in my opinion.

I don't mind stock characters or one-sided/one-dimensional characters *per se*, as should be evident from my reading lists and reviews. It all depends on what is important for the story, in my opinion. So, for example, when an author decides to have a romance (the protagonist Osgood and Rebecca, who travels with him to England in search for the lost chapters of Dickens' last, unfinished novel) you need more than write that they are interested in each other--you also need to give the reader an *emotional impact*, something I found lacking. Yes, on the intellectual level it was clear what was going on, but it didn't resonate, there was no emotional punch. Part of the problem here, I think, is because the research element gets in the way, creating a distance between me, the story and the characters. Interesting and fascinating as the research truly was--how much the author knew about the times, setting etc.--it also prevented me from getting more "into" the characters and their situation. The only exception

being Tom Branagan (especially the US scenes) and the insane Dickens stalker, Louisa Parr Barton--there was something that worked perfectly!

Katrina: Matthew Pearl creates such vivid environments. I bought the Poe Shadow a few years back and it sat on my shelf because I didn't have much time to read it. When I made the time...I couldn't believe how much I loved that book! They are incredibly detailed but very densely written and they aren't quick reads by any means but the time it takes is completely worth it. The book is vivid and real and brings the period to life as few authors are able. The characters, many of them drawn from historical sources, become, to the reader, living breathing people capable of complex motivations and actions. Pearl is also fabulous with little details, something that might seem incidental when first presented turns out to be a central plot point. I would recommend this or any of the Matthew Pearl books for the detail, skill and excellence of the writing style.

Michelle: Pearl plunges into the world of 1870, skillfully blending historical fact and literary fiction into a riveting tale about Charles Dickens' unfinished last novel, *The Mystery of Edwin Drood*. Drawing on original letters and newspapers, Pearl recounts the extraordinary celebrity of Dickens during his speaking tour of America, where hundreds would line up overnight, enduring freezing temperatures in the hopes of obtaining tickets to his sold out shows.

The seedy underworld of the opium trade washes ashore in Boston Harbor with tragic results. Daniel Sands, a young apprentice for publisher Fields, Osgood, & Co., is killed while on an errand to pick up the coveted manuscript of Dickens' last serial installment of Drood.

Daniel's mentor, James Osgood (of the aforementioned Fields, Osgood, & Co.) is disbelieving of the police's insinuation that Daniel was involved with opium. In an effort to unravel the mystery, Osgood and Daniel's sister Rebecca set sail for London to investigate the recently deceased Dickens' papers. They hope the answers to Daniel's death might lie in the missing ending to Drood.

Intelligent and fun, *The Last Dickens* is chock full of insight into the history of publishing, the politics of opium, and the trials and triumphs of literary genius.

Pearl has garnered acclaim for his previous books, *The Dante Club* and *The Poe Shadow*. His well-researched literary mysteries are thoroughly enjoyable, and particularly appealing to avid readers. They are literally literary, his titles say it all.

Rebecca Foster: Fluffy yet compelling. The puff from Dan Brown at the disguise says it all: Pearl's is a slightly low-brow model of literary old fiction. I stunned myself with my willingness to offer Pearl one other try; after all, I discovered The Dante membership surprisingly slow-paced and uninteresting regardless of its sensational topic matter. yet I'm happy I persisted and skim this one. Though it has Pearl's ordinary gradual exposition and just a little flat personality development, the Victorian settings and Dickensian subject intended that I did get pleasure from it. Serve cold, with a pleasant white wine. The final Dickens is a fascinating breed of mystery. it really is mysterious, all right, but in addition historical. And it is literary! it truly is like anyone has taken 3 of my favorite ideas: mysteries, histories, and lifeless writers, and prompted them to collide within the Victorian era, simply to see what happens. What fun! Unfortunately, i did not just like the final Dickens up to i wished to. I think this publication will unavoidably be in comparison to Drood , so i will get that out of ways after which now not point out it again. This booklet is far better than Drood. Its tale is superior; its characters are extra enjoyable; and it does a more robust activity exploring the secret of The secret of Edwin Drood.
