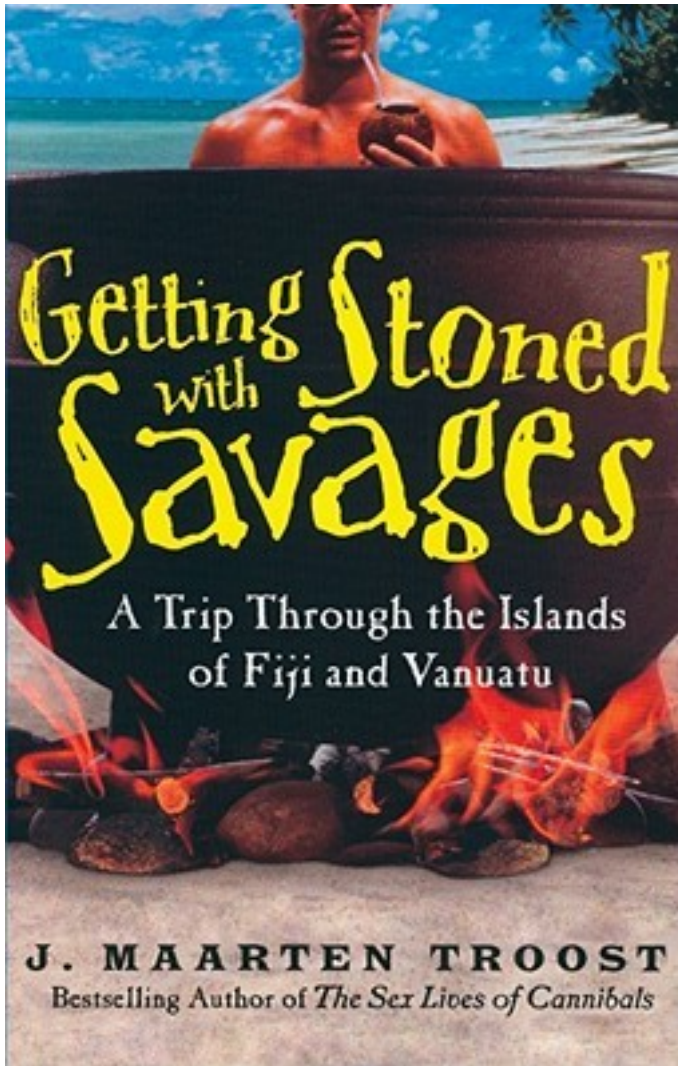

With *The Sex Lives of Cannibals*, Maarten Troost established himself as one of the most engaging and original travel writers around. *Getting Stoned with Savages* again reveals his wry wit and infectious joy of discovery in a side-splittingly funny account of life in the farthest reaches of the world. After two grueling years on the island of Tarawa, battling feral dogs, machete-wielding neighbors, and a lack of beer on a daily basis, Maarten Troost was in no hurry to return to the South Pacific. But as time went on, he realized he felt remarkably out of place among the trappings of twenty-first-century America. When he found himself holding down a job—one that might possibly lead to a career—he knew it was time for him and his wife, Sylvia, to repack their bags and set off for parts unknown.

Getting Stoned with Savages tells the hilarious story of Troost's time on Vanuatu—a rugged cluster of islands where the natives gorge themselves on kava and are still known to “eat the man.” Falling into one amusing misadventure after another, Troost struggles against typhoons, earthquakes, and giant centipedes and soon finds himself swept up in the laid-back, clothing-optional lifestyle of the islanders. When Sylvia gets pregnant, they decamp for slightly-more-civilized Fiji, a fallen paradise where the local chiefs can be found watching rugby in the house next door. And as they contend with new parenthood in a country rife with prostitutes and government coups, their son begins to take quite naturally to island living—in complete contrast to his dad.

Insightful reviews

Peter: Considering that not a lot happens in the book, Troost manages to make this book about his life in Fiji and Vanuatu fairly funny. By "not a lot happens", I mean he doesn't go adventuring through the jungle, searching for new species of sharks, or some other extreme activity. He spends much of his time in the village or city where he and his wife are based. He manages to make what might have been a fairly mundane existence seem exotic, which is what it probably is since most people are never going to be able to go to Vanuatu anyway. He does briefly visit a volcano, which turns out to be a but more dangerous than he had expected, but mostly, he's sticking to town.

There's a nice amount of history and information on the cultures of the two countries. Some interesting info on the local food and culture, and some funny stories about how kava is consumed, which is part of the 'getting stoned' of the title. I would have liked some more interaction with the local people, but I'm not sure if I would have been able to interact much more than Troost does.

Also, I thought it was great that he figured out that his job was not the right fit for him and he did something about it. Rather than sticking with it since that would be the safe choice, he left the job and went to Vanuatu. Yes, his wife was able to transfer her job to the South Pacific fairly easily, but it is still admirable to pick up stakes and leave a safe position like this. They decide 'this place is not for us' lets see what else is out there, and they just do it. Not many people have that kind of courage, and that's something to admire.

Ru: A great follow-up to "The Sex Lives of Cannibals" and probably about as entertaining as J. Maarten Troost's first book, as well. It's a fantasy many people have -- to pick up and move away to a tropical island, and not just for a vacation. Troost and wife Sylvia find their fates once again leading them in that direction, after some life changes while living and working in the Washington, D.C. area. Troost recounts a story of seeing a woman with a broken leg board the subway, and not one man offering his seat to the woman who was having obvious difficulty standing. The lack of politeness contrasted against his previous experiences with his island neighbors in Kiribati is but one of several things that tip him in favor of seeking a new life.

Also similar to "Cannibals" is the aspect of this book functioning as a straightforward travelogue. Much of what Troost writes about Vanuatu (and Fiji) is not particularly flattering, but it isn't done with malice or even a hint of xenophobia; he simply tells a story that finds him odd predicaments and unaccustomed to his new surroundings. Particularly funny is his trying to comprehend the culture of Vanuatu upon hearing stories of those who "eat the man." Naturally, he seeks to meet those who "eat the man," because, why wouldn't you?

If fish-out-of-water stories are not your thing, then this book won't grab your attention in the least. However, it's a fairly quick read and never boring, in my opinion. The book has a serious side, too, but only just slightly. Hearing the author's account of learning about 9/11 from his island abode is captivating but doesn't get discussed to any great length. I also found myself continually concerned for the well-being of his pregnant wife Sylvia, and thankfully that storyline is covered from beginning to end.

But, Troost has wit and style, is a good observer and adopts a good natured, humorous persona. A fun read.
