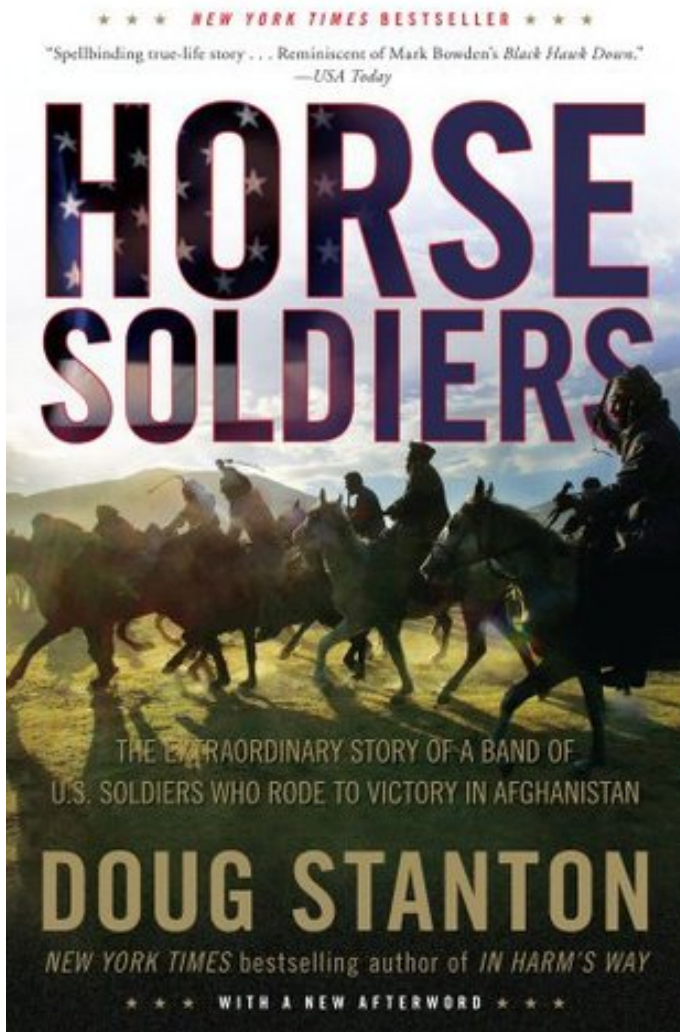

Horse Soldiers is the dramatic account of a small band of Special Forces soldiers who secretly entered Afghanistan following 9/11 and rode to war on horses against the Taliban. Outnumbered forty to one, they pursued the enemy army across the mountainous Afghanistan terrain and, after a series of intense battles, captured the city of Mazar-i-Sharif, which was strategically essential to defeat their opponent throughout the country.

The bone-weary American soldiers were welcomed as liberators as they rode into the city, and the streets thronged with Afghans overjoyed that the Taliban regime had been overthrown.

Then the action took a wholly unexpected turn. During a surrender of six hundred Taliban troops, the Horse Soldiers were ambushed by the would-be POWs. Dangerously overpowered, they fought for their lives in the city's immense fortress, Qala-i-Janghi, or the House of War. At risk were the military gains of the entire campaign: if the soldiers perished or were captured, the entire effort to outmaneuver the Taliban was likely doomed.

Deeply researched and beautifully written, Stanton's account of the Americans' quest to liberate an oppressed people touches the mythic. The soldiers on horses combined ancient strategies of cavalry warfare with twenty-first-century aerial bombardment technology to perform a seemingly impossible feat. Moreover, their careful effort to win the hearts of local townspeople proved a valuable lesson for America's ongoing efforts in Afghanistan.

Insightful reviews

Elisif: This was a very interesting book, and a very satisfying read. Better than other military books I've read because it is written by a journalist who did LOTS of interviews, including Afghans. I was hoping this would be a horse book as well as a military book, but not so much a horse book. Yes, they do ride horses, and that is significant in that modern warfare is not usually fought from horseback, but there isn't much else about the horses themselves. But it was a very interesting book about how Special Forces works, and how they partner with local people/generals/militias to achieve an objective. This covers much of the same ground as "First In" by Gary Schroen, a CIA officer who went in to Afghanistan right after Sept. 11 with a team to lay the groundwork for special forces, who followed shortly after. However, reading about how successful this first few months in Afghanistan was makes it all the more frustrating and sad that the Bush administration screwed things up there so badly by not maintaining attention in that region, repeating mistakes of the past in Afghanistan.

Russ: I don't know as much as I should about the war in Afghanistan, which is one of the reasons I read this book. It's not a broad historical perspective on the conflict, but rather a close look at the initial Special Forces and CIA actions in Afghanistan. It follows multiple soldiers and is, at first, a little overwhelming. I had difficulty remembering who all of the men were. Stanton

hits his stride after a couple of chapters, though, and the story becomes very compelling as it incorporates Northern Alliance Afghanistan warlords, soldiers, and citizens. The ending, which was foreshadowed strongly at the beginning of the book, was a little anti-climactic and not quite as satisfying as I had hoped. I realize that this is non-fiction, but I think there are ways it could have been a little more revelatory and exciting.

Overall, though, this is a really good book and a great introduction to the war in Afghanistan.

J: BEWARE of spoilers. (Or is that possible when commenting on a piece of non-fiction?)

OK, I have to admit at the outset, that I didn't read the whole book. Knowing the good proximate (short-term) outcome of the events covered in the book, I called it a day after I felt I had absorbed the flavor of the challenge at hand and the teamwork that achieved the goal.

I got bogged down in the military minutiae of the covert campaign -- unlike military history fans, I don't get stoked by types of weapons or rounds, troop formations, fortified locations, or hit/ kill stats, etc. Hate to admit this, too, but the slew of foreign names (as in, all the Afghani personal names and village names) really slowed down my reading.

I did read slightly more than half the book, and enjoyed the photos, which bring to life the terrain and Afghani chieftans and U.S. military members who participated in the under-cover foray into Afghanistan in 2001 to fight the Taliban, right after the terrorist airplane takeover crashes in the U.S. on 9/11.

I stopped on page 224 (of 360 pages), where it says, "From that point on, realized Milo, they'd beaten the Taliban."

That said, I did get a lot out of the 224 pages I read.

The dedication of the special force members depicted is clear.

The odds they faced were astronomical.

The nature of their mission was unique: To maximize ground efforts by Afghani horsemen using America's highest technology. As the author notes at one point, the union of fighters on opposite ends of the tech spectrum was like the Flintstones joining up with the Jetsons.

And yet, we're not sure what long-term positive effect these U.S. "horse soldiers" may have had on the course of history, since the U.S. and other secular nations face continued resistance, and attack, by parties who believe Islam's Shariah law should rule across the globe.

I am grateful for the people who serve in our Armed Forces. I am grateful for their supportive spouses, too. But I know I could never marry a guy in special forces who couldn't talk about the heart -- and flesh, blood drops and gristle -- of his work.

It quite places the reader within the atmosphere. Of course, I had examine Dostum and the battles for Mazar-e Sharif and Qala-i Jangi in *Jawbreaker: The assault on Bin encumbered and Al-Qaeda: a private Account* by way of the CIA's Key box Commander and primary In: *An Insider's Account of the way the CIA Spearheaded the warfare on Terror in Afghanistan*, yet this publication contains plenty extra juicy detail. However, it has a few fragmented sentences and the tale does not flow. Inaccuracies and inconsistencies plague the book. At one point, the writer is describing a trench procedure and claims it's 5 ft deep. Sentences later, he claims that it was once waist-high. In one other instance, he describes the warriors riding a Gator car loaded down with numerous bins of MREs and within the subsequent paragraph he talks approximately how the warriors have been out of food. Writing approximately occasions in 2001, he talks of Captain Nelson pondering again 15 years to his commissioning. No SF captain will be allowed to command a staff if he wasn't capable of make significant in 15 years. It truly is visible that during 2009 while giving his interview, CPT Nelson was once most probably then a fifteen 12 months veteran. Wild claims additionally pulse in the course of the book. He credit a Command leader Warrant Officer, which isn't a military rank. The ebook additional is slowed down by way of pointless details. What up with this sentence? How did an editor leave out this? (page 67): "He had drawn arrows with a crimson Sharpie pen on a large roll of paper fed via an easel, marking the team's sure, strong advance. The arrows bulldozed via miles of sand, scree, rock, pomegranate, blue chicory and candy acacia, pine tree and popular, over riverbeds, up cliffsides, throughout forlorn, twilight plateaus, and saved pushing for the horizon, the place at evening the celebrities could arise out of the singed cauldron of the fall evening and wheel overhead and smear the sky with historical phosphorescence." What did he draw? Why did he draw it...? Did he draw on a map? ... I did not comprehend what the writer used to be attempting to convey. Just as unusual is that this sentence on web page 50: "Twenty-four hours later, he stepped off in the dead of night at K2, in Uzbekistan, the sky engorged, oozing the milk of a brand new starlight." And how did an editor (if there has been one) now not realize the insane sentence constitution of "Dean pretty well believed there wasn't whatever he could not improve, himself so much of all" on web page 169. On web page 283, we're instructed that Herat is "about sixty miles west of Mazar", whilst the map contrary web page 1 indicates it truly is over one hundred fifty miles! Then, on web page 289 we're informed that "General Dostum could manage to pay for them secure passage to the close by historic urban of Herat, east of Mazar". So now Herat is east of Mazar? Stanton additionally says "Chechnyans" rather than "Chechens". The booklet additionally suffers from layman's mistakes--such as calling a C-130 as a "jet"; pertaining to an AC-130 as a tanker while the correct designation is KC-130 (AC is the Spectre gunship version). One deceptive topic of this ebook is that the "Horse Soldiers" (ODAs 595 and 534) controlled to defeat the Taliban and "liberate Afghanistan" opposed to all odds. Yeah, with the exception of the truth that there were, like, 15 different ODAs curious about the total campaign! And that the pony Soldiers' in basic terms goal used to be Mazar-e Sharif! Page 80: "Nelson appeared around. Those twelve men in this helicopter comprised the total American battling strength remarkable again at bin Laden. It was once simply them, he realized. Them alone." You know, even as Nelson and ODA 595 have been flying into Afghanistan, a few 2 hundred military Rangers, ninety one Delta strength operators, and one other ODA (555) was once being inserted as well. simply sayin'.

Terri: Fantastic. completely fantastic. Books like this infrequently come alongside - the books that are meant to exceed the five celebrity Goodreads score system. To me, *Horse Soldiers*, via a ways and away, is a kind of books. The tale in itself is astounding. team of certain Forces men will be dropped into Afghanistan with the specific purpose of helping the Northern Alliance by way of calling in bombs on targets. So yes, that tale in itself is fascinating, and inspirational, yet then you definitely need to upload into the equation the truth that they do that on horseback, in a opposed and brutal landscape, and that there's an writer here, a real tale teller, who can weave fabulous magic. I truthfully have by no means learn something rather like it. Doug Stanton layers his tale in a very impressive way. He does not simply inform the tale, he promises a 360 measure view of the lead up and the orchestration and the finale. He places you within the head of the wives, the Nightstalker pilots, the Chinook door gunners, the neighborhood Afghans, the Northern Alliance generals, commanders, canines bodies, the medics, the horses (yes, the horses), the precise Forces guys, their lives, their thoughts, their idiosyncrasies. he's taking you alongside at the Nightstalker flights, the adventure from pre 9/11, to 9/11, to put up 9/11, to Uzbekistan and Pakistan, he's taking you in addition to hundreds of thousands of horseman as they journey in waves on the line of Taliban gunfire and missile and tank fire. He glues all of it jointly and wraps you in it until eventually you switch that final web page and shut the book. this isn't a publication i'll fail to remember in a hurry.
