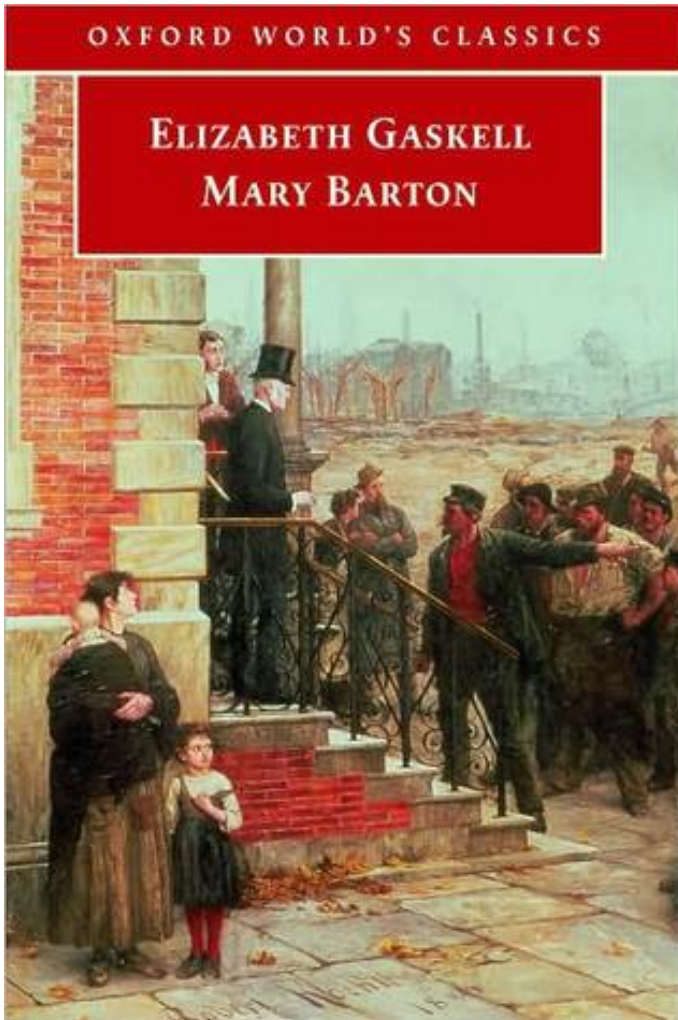

This is Elizabeth Gaskell's first novel, a widely acclaimed work based on the actual murder, in 1831, of a progressive mill owner. It follows Mary Barton, daughter of a man implicated in the murder, through her adolescence, when she suffers the advances of the mill owner, and later through love and marriage. Set in Manchester, between 1837-42, it paints a powerful and moving picture of working-class life in Victorian England.

Emma: Clearly a novel with a purpose, bordering almost on propaganda. Yes, Mrs. Gaskell, I understand that conditions were poor in Industrial Manchester. However, I don't think that justifies much of the plot's resolution: I don't think the characters' motivations are at all realistic.

While I think the Victorian heartstrings would probably have been tugged by the amount of religious piety she lays upon her poor, ignorant, working class characters, I found it overtly patronising. This is perhaps because we now accept that money doesn't determine humanity, but it meant that it was all laid on a bit too thick - like she needed to justify her choice of subject matter. Though I suppose she kind of did.

Nowhere near as good as North and South - perhaps understandable as this is clearly 'first novel' instability, I feel like Gaskell is trying to find her feet. Mary Barton doesn't hold a candle to Margaret, although she did get a bit more interesting towards the end and actually showed a backbone, which is always nice in a Victorian heroine. The conflict between duty to a father and to a lover really highlighted how screwed a woman was in patriarchal society. I suppose the romance was overwrought and contrite, but I still enjoyed it, and thought the ending, once Gaskell had said what she had to say about Manchester itself, was a good and interesting resolution.

Brianna Z: It's no secret I love Gaskell. This book is beautifully written as usual, and I cried during all the tragic and poignant moments, told with grace and compassion by Gaskell's delicate pen. It's similar to North and South in that it is about the relationship between workers and the men for whom they work, but it's fairly evident that MB is Gaskell's "novice" piece (it is her first work). She has a very good story to tell and important social commentary to make, but it can get fairly heavy-handed and obvious when she's trying to convey a moral or two - there are practically neon signs pointing out, "Hey, here's a moral...and here's another one! Just wanted you to know...". They're not told in an unpleasant, grating way (think Louisa May Alcott), but I kind of get the feeling she was worried her readers wouldn't be intelligent enough to discern when she was trying to illustrate an important truth. It wasn't really my favorite thing.

The part of the story I DID like is how Mary starts off as kind of a air-headed, simpering girly-girl, but then really develops her own identity by the end of the novel (no spoilers here). I was worried that she would be that way through the entire thing, but she develops into quite the courageous and noteworthy individual. I got chills when Jem kept asking for her after she saves him from a rather unfortunate situation (Yup, the lady rescues the male hero in this one):

"Where is she? Where is she? Where is she?" *sighs dreamily* (If you've read it, you'll know what I'm talking about. Especially you ladies.)

In conclusion, I enjoyed it immensely. And I hope they make a BBC miniseries.

David Beeson: Reading *Mary Barton*, her first novel, it is easy to see what an excellent writer Elizabeth Gaskell would become: the story is an absorbing one, the background well constructed and dramatic, the characters appealing and interesting. However, it is in the later books that her potential truly realises itself.

In *Mary Barton*, there is not enough depth to the characters. While it is true that Mary herself is by no means all of a piece, but on the contrary brings much of her own misfortune on herself through her vanity and early frivolity, flaws that do not just contrast but conflict with her underlying loyalty and generosity, she is all frivolous for a time and all generous later. In later novels Gaskell will show us with much greater skill how the different strands of a character can mix and oppose each other, at the same time.

The background, working class Manchester in the 1840s is vividly described, as is the terrible injustice of the wealthy enjoying excess in the middle of the poor, often starving, who generate their riches for them. It is hard not to share Gaskell's sympathy for the plight of the downtrodden, and to feel the wealthy owe it to themselves as much as to the under-privileged to do more for them, but the description is too harsh, too one-sided, in short too Dickensian, to be entirely convincing.

Even when she adjusts the balance, by denouncing the worst extremes of trade union action (vitriol attacks on scabbing workers, for instance), the morality feels too simplistic, as though we're being preached a sermon on principles that are a little too obvious.

The story, too, is predictable. I repeatedly had the sense of knowing what had happened or was evidently about to happen, long before the characters did, and therefore of wondering why they couldn't see it too. Nevertheless, the overall plot is a good one, and Gaskell's timing is excellent: she covers a period of over ten years in the first half of the book, to concentrate the second half on the most dramatic part of her plot, revolving around the crime to which the story leads and the subsequent trial. That pacing, and the tensions leading up to the trial, are the novel's greatest strengths, and they make it worth reading.

Nevertheless, if you are not a Gaskell fan – and far more people ought to be – *Mary Barton* shouldn't be your starting point. *North and South* or *Wives and Daughters* are truly outstanding novels, a delight to read and wonderful examples of what writing should be.

If you're already a Gaskell fan, as I am, then it's worth spending the time on her first novel to see where the greatness arose. And a version read by the incomparable Juliet Stevenson has to be a great way in. But otherwise, I recommend turning to one of the great later novels first.
