Rebekah Shuffle: The Tiger who came to tea is a book about a girl called Sophie who has tea with her mother but is interrupted midway by a large tiger who is extremely hungry and wanted to join Sophie and her mum for tea. The tiger came in and drank and ate everything, he even drank all the water in the tap and Sophie couldn't have a bath. Finally the tiger left but left nothing for dad for dinner, so when dad came home he suggested they eat out. The next day Sophie bought tiger food just in case the tiger ever came back, but he never did.

One the reasons I like this book is due to the simple and effective illustrations and the clear flow of the story of the book , this can enable the children to guess what happens in the book before reading the story to help enhance their imagination; due to the clear sentence structure it makes it easier to read, which is why I would state that the age range is between 4-7, it depends on their age on how you can use this book as a learning tool.

This book can be used in a variety of curriculum subjects, such as Literacy; an example of an activity related to the book can be creating an invitation to tea for the tiger or an animal of the children's choice for tea and asking the children to write some rules for the animal before they come. Another subject which the book can be linked to is Design and Food Technology; one activity is that the children can design the tin of tiger food that Sophie got for the tiger and have to create an advert for the tiger food (to demonstrate persuasive writing). The activity for food technology is to create an afternoon tea based on a certain theme or audience. This can also link with Geography by learning about where certain animals live, how we are effecting their habitats and how animals become extinct.

This book can be used within a variety of subjects and be crossed in curriculum, which is why this would be a great learning tool for a child in a classroom .

Sarfraz: This is a story about a tiger; a tiger so hungry he shows up on the doorstep of a house where he is greeted by a little girl named Sophie and her mother. The tiger asks if he can have tea with them and is allowed in. When he is offered a sandwich he eats all of them from the

plate, he does the same with the same with the buns and the milk. He then decides to explore the house eating and drinking everything that he can find. The mother is shocked but Sophie is fascinated by the big furry tiger. The tiger finally leaves after thanking them for a nice tea. When the father arrives, he is told of what has happened who decides to take the family out to a cafe for tea.

The story keeps the audience at edge, allowing them to think about who might be at the door? What will the tiger do/eat next? And so on. This allows children to be creative with their responses knowing that all ideas are a possibility in this story. The book is complimented with colourful pictures detailing the big furry tiger and the mess he leaves behind. The sentences are fairly simple and would appeal to young children.

I think this book would be ideal for early years and KS1 where the adult takes charge and creates even more suspense through his/her tone. Although it could be read for pleasure in KS2, the sentences are all over the pages, in no particular structure; it therefore might not be relevant in KS2 as it does not clearly define the use of proper paragraphs. In early years and KS1, it could be used for counting (how many different types of food the tiger eats), for drawing their own tiger and perhaps their own version of the story of what they would do if a tiger visited them.
